It's base price was \$3595.

The Model 50Z was compatible with IBM's PS/2 line of peripherals and ran on IBM's proprietary operating system, OS/2. The IBM PS/2 Model 50Z was a popular choice for home and small business users because of its performance, expandability, and compatibility with a wide range of software.
