

Timex Sinclair

The Timex Sinclair was a home computer produced by Timex Corporation in the early 1980s. It was based on the Sinclair ZX80 and ZX81 home computers, which were developed by Sinclair Research in the United Kingdom. The Timex Sinclair was essentially a rebranded version of the ZX80 and ZX81, with some minor changes. It featured a Zilog Z80 microprocessor running at 3.25 MHz, 1 KB of RAM (expandable to 16 KB) and a built-in cassette tape drive for data storage. It was designed to connect to a TV and retailed for \$99.

The Timex Sinclair was marketed as a low-cost home computer for the general public, but it was not as popular as other home computers of the time like the Commodore 64 and Atari 800. The Timex Sinclair was known for its low cost and portability, but also for its limitations in terms of memory and storage.
